Deep dive into our AHP workforce

Apprenticeship update

Registered Nurse Degree Apprenticeships (RNDA) resource hub

As part of the manifesto commitment to deliver an additional 50,000 nurse to the workforce, the government has announced funding to support employers increase numbers on RNDA. Skills for Health new RNDA Hub webpage now contains links and resources to all parts of the project from the apprenticeship levy, to entry requirements and case studies from both employers and apprentices and their experiences.

In addition, following feedback from employers, new resources have been added to the <u>Skills for Health RNDA webpage</u> to support accessing the funding available for this initiative. These include links to the previously circulated resources such as the stakeholder engagement event presentations, the FAQ's, procurement guidance and a <u>new return on investment cost calculator</u> to support writing business cases.

Nursing in Social Care film

We are delighted and excited to release our <u>new Nursing is Social Care video</u>. The sevenminute video was filmed at Wren Hall and Landermeads nursing homes in Nottingham.

The film showcases the role of nursing in social care and we hope it will attract nurses and nursing associates who want to work in this rewarding sector. It also conveys the passion for what they do, the varied nature of the career, and how social care nursing is about supporting people in the long term, and building relationships that are not always possible in the acute sector.

New guide to help overseas nurses go beyond basic English skills

Occupational English Test (OET), in collaboration with HEE, has launched the <u>Living the Language</u>: A nurse's guide to English usage in British life and work. This new guide aims to help overseas nurses working in the UK healthcare system improve their English language skills.

The guide can be used to help overseas nurses move beyond basic English to become competent communicators at work and at home. It is packed with practical advice and focuses on the communication skills nurses need to adapt, integrate, and settle in faster.

The guide also includes practical advice and guidance on workplace and patient communication. This includes common challenges such as local accents and dialects, person-centred care, and active listening. It also includes tips on the everyday use of British English in social settings and provides help with settling into new multidisciplinary teams and professional cultures. e-Learning for Healthcare (e-LfH) Programme

e-LfH COVID-19 programme

In March 2020, HEE's e-LfH team created the <u>COVID-19 e-LfH programme</u> in response to the COVID-19 that is free to access, without logging in, for the entire UK health and care workforce, including those working in the NHS, the independent sector and social care.

The programme includes key materials to help the health and care workforce respond to COVID-19. Since its launch, the programme has been used over 1.6million times.

Pharmacy updates

Interim Foundation Pharmacist Programme (IFPP) update

The IFPP that launched on 24 August, is progressing well, and has recently received its 1000th registrant. This programme is aimed at the 2019/20 cohort of pre-registration pharmacists whose training and registration have been disrupted by COVID-19. The programme also provides a unique opportunity to accelerate pharmacists' early years' education and training reform and supports the delivery of the NHS People Plan for 2020/21.

The IFPP resources are also growing, and in addition to the handbooks have which to guide pharmacists and supervisors through the programme, a brand-new guide to Learning Opportunities has also been published. This guide provides provisionally registered pharmacists (and their supervisors) with links to free to access resources that are appropriate to support learning and development throughout the IFPP.

Registration for the IFPP is still open, and the IFPP programme webpage provides guidance on eligibility and how to register. The programme team also continues to send weekly updates and to subscribe to receive these, email fpp@hee.nhs.uk, stating IFPP Updates in the subject header.

A bridge to vision: Improving staff confidence in supporting sight loss for people with learning disabilities

Did you know adults with learning disabilities are ten times more likely to have significant sight loss than the rest of the population?

To help the workforce look after this cohort of particularly vulnerable people, the South East Intellectual Disabilities Programme supported a joint training project with Avenues and the Royal National Institute for the Blind. The aim was to combine their skills and expertise to introduce Vision Champions Training for the Learning Disability workforce.

This person-centred best practice approach training has positively impacted staff by:

- Building their confidence and knowledge to support adults with a learning disability, complex needs, and sight loss
- Enabling them to recognise signs of vision loss, and as a result, there was a
 positive impact on behaviour
- Encouraging them to use tools and new understanding to support their colleagues to look after people differently
- Providing them with awareness on how and when to adapt environments to accommodate sight needs and access relevant sight and primary care services for prevention and treatment.
